

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Nearly 240,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer every year, but early detection and advanced treatments are helping save more lives than ever before. In fact, when detected in the earliest stages, the cure rate for breast cancer is a staggering 98%. That's why getting mammograms is so important—they help detect cancer at an early stage when it is most treatable.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, a highly respected team of medical experts, recommends that most women be screened with mammography every two years starting at age 40. This recommendation recently changed to start at 40 rather than 50, due to new research that supports the benefit of starting earlier.

Health Disparities

“Health disparities” are preventable differences in health among different social or racial groups. Health Disparities are a complex and challenging problem across the world. Social factors play the largest role in shaping the overall health of communities. For example, the ability to access healthcare, a safe living environment, racial equity, nutritious food, quality education, and supportive relationships free of discrimination are all incredibly important to your overall health.

Those who face health disparities often have a higher risk for breast cancer. In the U.S., certain racial and ethnic groups experience a higher risk of breast cancer and an increased likelihood of being diagnosed with cancer when it has already spread.

- Non-Hispanic Black women have the highest breast cancer death rate. ([source](#))










Activity 2: Wear Pink

Proudly wear pink on Friday, October 20, 2023, to show your support for and raise awareness for breast cancer.



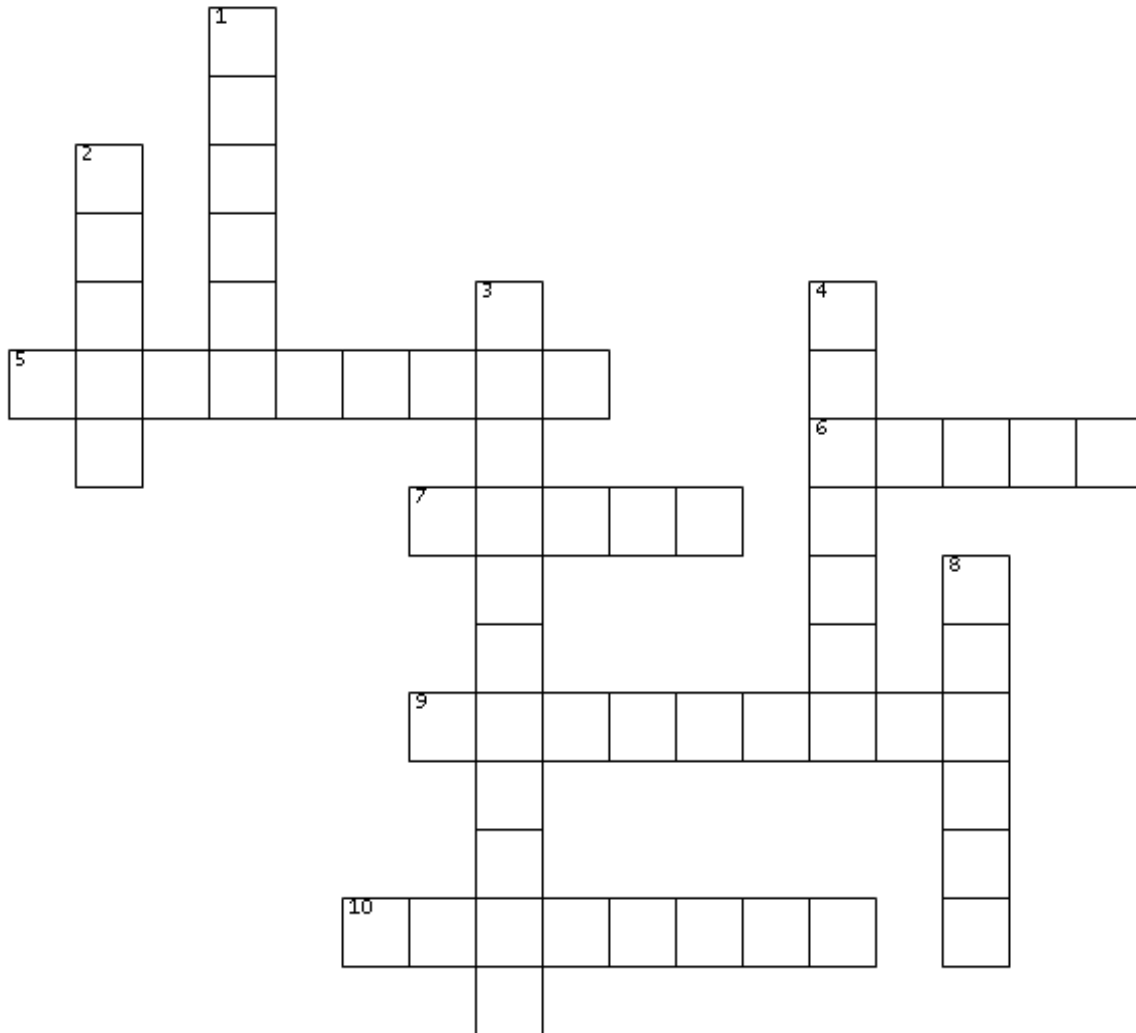
